"If I had a million dollars..."

In the first Dean's Newsletter from spring 2007, I wrote how private giving provides the lifeblood for academic programs within our University. This was especially true for Appalachian and our College in the 2006-07 academic year. Thanks in part to a transformational gift from Ron and Katherine Harper of Charlotte, the College recorded more than \$2.0 million dollars in private gifts, gifts-in-kind and pledge commitments in 2006-07. Thank you to all of the F&AA faculty and staff who made this record fundraising year possible for us and our students! The challenge continues for 2007-08...

Working together with your Chair and the Dean, we can make a positive difference for your programs and students by securing private gifts and gifts-inkind.

Before you meet with your Chair to discuss your fundraising needs, I recommend that you follow this three-step process:

1. Write a "Case for Support" statement (the who, what, when, where and why of the concept) outlining your project. This is normally one page in length.

2. Develop a workable timeline for your funding needs (next semester, next year, in the next five years, etc...) allowing enough time for us, together, to "sow the fields."

3. Research and then create a prospect list of who (individuals and corporate foundations) can help fund your projects.

Once you have completed these three steps, present them to your Chair for review. Upon approval of the Chair, we and your Chair (or their designate) can then plan an appropriate strategy to secure private funding for your particular project. This action plan worked well in 2006-07 and I expect it will continue to prove successful this year and into the future.

Be on the look-out for some other "transformational" gifts that together we should finalize for our College this 2007-08 academic year! I look forward to working with many more of you in the future to help secure funding for your important projects.

WASU's Dan Hill leads first Radio Farm System Institute

The first ever Kellar Radio Farm System Institute, coordinated by Dan Hill, general manager of WASU, concluded July 17 amid rave reviews from both radio industry veterans and the students.

The first of its kind, the program is a farm system for future radio broadcasters designed to attract, train and create opportunity for talented students who have a passion for the broadcast industry and possible ownership. Seventeen students qualified for the inaugural program and were taught by industry professionals who volunteered their time and expertise to teach sessions over the 10-day event.

Another unique aspect of the Kellar Radio Farm System is that each student who successfully completed the program now has the opportunity, anytime in the next 10 years, to apply to Appalachian and the Kellar Radio Farm System Institute for \$50,000 in seed money for investment in radio broadcast ownership. Former broadcaster Art Kellar gave \$500,000 to make it possible and to get the program underway. His vision was to see young broadcasters become entrepreneurs and get into ownership and benefit just as he did.

The workshop was led by one of our nation's leading authorities on Photovoltaic Technology, John Wiles, from New Mexico. Many NC electricians were in attendance reflecting the increasing interest in this technology.

Jeff Tiller (TEC) participated in several meetings of the Duke Energy Collaborative on Energy Efficiency and Renewables, held in Greensboro over the past several months. Other members of the collaborative include Duke Energy officials, as well as representatives of Lowe's Home Improvement, Food Lion, UNC Chapel Hill, NC State, Duke Energy, NC State Energy Office, the Public Utilities Commission, the Public Staff of the Utilities Commission and a variety of other organizations. Tiller provided testimony, as well as considerable input, on the important role energy efficiency could provide in improving our energy efficiency cost effectively.

The efforts of Project Director Jeff Tiller (TEC), professors Dennis Grady (Political Science) and Dennis Scanlin (TEC), associate professor Jeff Ramsdell (TEC), research staff members Laurel Elam, Brent Summerville and Jason Hoyle, and graduate and undergraduate students including Micah Shristi, Jacob Clarke, held working group meetings over the summer on Energy Supply, Buildings and Industry, and Transporation and Alternative Fuels to seek input into a new State Energy Plan. The final plan, which has to undergo public hearings and final approval by the North Carolina Energy Policy Council, will be published in early 2008.

Jeff Tiller (TEC) gave a two-hour presentation to the state meeting of the NC Mechanical Inspectors Association on the energy efficiency provisions of the NC Mechanical Code. The presentation focused on high efficiency window requirements, air sealing, duct sealing, duct insulation, controls and efficiency requirements for heating and cooling, moisture control, health and safety and other issues.

Ray Miller (T/D) received the distinguished alumni award in the spring at the University of Oregon. He also served as the commencement speaker for the university's College of Music and Dance. In June Miller presented a paper about Gene Kelly at the Dance and Scholars Conference in Paris.

The award is presented annually by the U. S. Army's Cadet Command and the Gen. Douglas MacArthur Foundation to outstanding battalions within the Army Reserve Officer Training Corps regions.

"It is quite an honor for Lt. Col. Jett and his cadre to receive this honor, because it not only speaks to the program's ability to produce lieutenants for the army, it speaks to the quality of lieutenant that he is producing and it also speaks to the quality of the program," said Col. Ken Bishop, commander of the U.S. Army Command 5th ROTC Brigade based at Fort Jackson, S.C.

The 5th Brigade includes programs in the Carolinas, Tennessee and Georgia. Appalachian commissioned 20 lieutenants into the United States Army last year. That is the first time since 1998 that the department commissioned that large of a number and was only the second time since 1990 that the battalion commissioned that many officers.

"Needless to say, in a time of war, we are very honored that 20 of the best and brightest students on campus volunteered to serve their country," said Lt. Col. Jett. "That is patriotism in the purest form. We wish them well and will pray for their safety."

Appalachian dedicates Katherine Harper Hall, recognizes \$1 million gift

Appalachian State University has named a portion of the building that houses the Department of Technology in honor of Katherine Harper of Charlotte.

K a t h e r i n e Harper is cofounder of Harper Corporation of



America and longtime supporter of flexography education. Mrs. Harper's husband, Ron, made a \$1 million gift to the university in her honor through the Appalachian State University Foundation.

The gift will provide \$300,000 to purchase and upgrade flexographic-related equipment and \$100,000 will establish the Katherine Harper Scholarship Endowment to provide scholarships for Harper Corporation employees or their children who want to pursue a degree at Appalachian.

A total of \$400,000 will be used to purchase equipment and upgrade materials in all of the programs located in the Department of Technology, and \$200,000 will establish the Katherine Harper Endowment for the Department of Technology to fund emerging technological needs and priorities identified by the faculty and department leaders.

Department of Technology Converts Builders to Increased Efficiency

In a several years' effort, Centex Homes in Charlotte has adopted recommendations from the ASU Department of Technology and Energy Center in homes now being constructed in the Charlotte area.

The homes have improved windows, higher efficiency furnaces, better duct sealing and air sealing, a ventilation system, and a number of other efficiency features. The project team has also redesigned the duct system for each plan and is seeking to implement a "lean and mean" duct system that is smaller, but more effective than traditional approaches.

Several hundred homes are being built this year using the new guidelines that ASU developed in collaboration with Centex. ASU's research and development team includes ASU professor Jeff Tiller, adjunct professors Lee Ball and Joe Crocker, research staff Laurel Elam and Beth Ainsworth, and undergraduate student Jacob Clarke.

A modified public forum model has been developed by the team to use students and their skills to facilitate topics that campus organizations and folks in the community feel are pertinent. Throughout the year, if there is a topic that your organization would like the community to know more about, please contact the Forensics Team.

The service team also will be leading Conversation Cafes in the spirit of Socrates Cafes developed by Christopher Phillips and launched across the nation by The Society for Philosophical Inquiry. The idea is to get students together in small groups of no more than 10 to practice community building speaking and listening. The topics organically surface at the beginning of the meeting and are then openly discussed as it appeals to each individual at that moment. Fundamentally, as stated the Society for Philosophical Inquiry, this is about philosophical sharing, about inspiring each participant to further discover her or his unique story, and to come to a keener sense of how she can best contribute to an evolving self and society. Finally, the team has a group of students who are interested in working on advocacy related curriculum and activities to take into area schools. Currently, a group is conducting interviews and research about communication and critical thinking (and the intersection of those) in our NC public school standard curriculum.
