# ACCOLADES

**Dr. Ed Brewer (Communication)** has published Organizational Communication: Today's Professional Life in Context, with Walker College of Business faculty member Dr. Jim Westerman. Additionally, he presented "Preliminary Exploration of International vs. US MBA Student Interpretation of Vague Language" with Terrence Holmes at the Society for Marketing Advances annual conference in Louisville in November.

Dr. Derek Davidson's (Theatre and Dance)

play "Ox," which premiered in In/Visible Theatre's most recent BOLO Fest (Boone Solo Festival), toured to the Asheville Fringe Arts Festival Jan 26-27



and to venues in Florida this semester. **Karen Sabo** (Theatre and Dance) produced the BOLO Fest, and this solo show stars Mark Suggs, a staff member at the university.



April Flanders' (Art) piece "Advance" has been purchased by the Asheville Museum of Science where it will be installed

in March. The piece addresses the breadth of the invasive species problem in North America and was created by printing brightly colored sheets of paper with invasive plant species using a layered monotype process. Flanders then made paper cutouts of 76 invasive animals using her printed invasive plant papers. The piece will become a part of the museum's permanent collection and will be on display for approximately 10 years.

#### Frankie Flood's (Art)

work "Peacemaker/ Piecemaker pizza cutter" was featured and published in the promotional information for in an exhibition that is



currently showing at the Kentucky Center for African American Heritage. The "I.M.A.G.I.N.E. Peace Now" exhibition is organized by Boris Bally and features decommissioned guns transformed into art objects by artists from the United States and five other countries. Bally brings together like-minded artists from around the world to make a powerful statement about gun violence in America and artistic expressions of peace.

Dr. Hessam Ghamari (Applied Design) presented two research projects at the 12th World Congress of Design and Health in Vienna, Austria in July 2017. The



first, "Quality of Life in Assisted Living Facilities: Identification of the Outdoor Attributes as Influential Factors of Therapeutic Environments" was an effort to identify and rank order the environmental attributes of the designed outdoor environment that attract eye fixation. The second project, "Wayfinding in Unfamiliar Indoor Healthcare Environments: An Evidence Based Design Approach Using Gaze-Tracking Technology" intended to identify and rank visual environment elements in hospitals that attract gaze fixation during wayfinding. Undergraduate interior design students Eva Clauss and Sarah Dickert assisted with this project as well.

Cara Hagan (Theatre and Dance) presented



a sneak peek of "LOAM," an experience in movement and sound exploring the relationship between the human body and soil, on Feb. 2. The Boone performance is followed by a world premiere in Durham, then touring throughout summer and fall in various cities around the country.

**Dr. Jiangxue (Ashley) Han (Communication)** was awarded the National Association of Television Program Executives (NATPE) faculty fellowship by their Educational Foundation, which allowed her to attend the annual NATPE convention Jan. 14-18 in Miami. Convention speakers included executives from media companies such as FOX, NBC, Lions Gate and more.



#### Gordon Hensley (Theatre

and Dance) was chosen in a national search to present as a guest artist at the January 2018 Virginia Thespian Festival. The festival was held in Virginia Beach and hosted more than 1,000 high school theatre students and their teachers. Hensley presented six specialty workshops on theatrical

makeup, materials, safety, and techniques. The festival was produced by the Educational Theatre Association, the national professional organization for theatre educators.

Dr. Brooke Hofsess (Art) was recently awarded the 2018 Preservice Chapter Sponsor of Excellence by the National Art Education Association for her work supporting the professional development of Appalachian's Art Education students. This spring, she will present eight papers at conferences including the American Educational Research Association, the National Art Education Association and the International Congress of Qualitative Inquiry. Her co-authored paper "Pause/Play: Curating as Living/Aesthetic Analysis" has just been published in Reconceptualizing Educational Research Methodology. Another recent work, "Turning Towards: Materializing New Possibilities through Curating" can be read in Arts-Based Research in Education: Foundations for Practice (2nd Edition). Wild Preserving, a new intergenerational and interdisciplinary research project exploring feminist contributions to Appalachian traditions and heritage, has been supported through a Graduate Research Associate Mentoring Program (GRAM) Award for the 2018-2020 cycle.

work "Recent Activity" was installed at PULSE Contemporary Art Fair (a satellite fair during Art Basel in Miami Beach). She will also present "Recent Activity" at the



College Art Association conference in Los Angeles in February 2018 as part of a panel titled "Women Artists, Social Issues, and The Resistance."

**Dr. Shanshan Lou (Communication)**, along with Dr. Hong Cheng (Virginia Commonwealth University), has published a book chapter "Advertising in China: Global Implications and Impacts" in China's Media Go Global. The collection brings together distinguished scholars from China and those with deep interest and knowledge of the country, to examine how the emergence of Chinese media will impact global media and communication. By interrogating the relationship between Chinese and Western media practices and perceptions, this volume provides an accessible and comprehensive guide to the complex debates about the impact of China on the media globe.

**Dr. Ray Miller and Dr. Jessica Wood (Theatre and Dance)** published "Merce Cunningham and Black Mountain: No Fixed Points" in the Appalachian Journal. This is a special issues on Black Mountain that coincides with the spring semester-long celebration of Black Mountain on the Appalachian's campus.

**Dr. Thomas Mueller (Communication)** has published "Donald Trump, Confederate Flags and NASCAR: Understanding Fandom in Stock Car Auto Racing," in the International Journal of Motorsport Management. The paper presents a multidimensional scale that identifies motivators and detractors in the sport. He was also appointed to serve on the university's Distance Education task force, which conducted a complete assessment and submitted recommendations for future action and development of Appalachian's online and hybrid programs.

Dr. Mimi Perreault (Communication), along with collaborators from the University of Missouri, published several articles, including "How Journalists Characterize Health Inequalities and Redefine Solutions for Native American Audiences" in Health Communication; "A Lineage of Leakers? The Contingency of Collective Memory in Coverage of Contemporary Leaking Cases" in Journalism Practice; "Dealing With Subsequent Crisis Response: An Evaluation of Transparency in Government Response to the New Jersey Boardwalk Fire" in Cases in Public Relations: Translating Ethics into Action; and "Coming to Terms with Chronic Pain: Exploring Resilience Across a Sample of Patients Living with Chronic Pain" in Traumatology, Special Issue on Resilience.

**Sarah Rich (Art)** is the lead author of the new book Shipwrecks and Provenance: In-situ Timber Sampling Protocols with a Focus on Wrecks of the Iberian Shipbuilding Tradition. The book details why timbers from wooden shipwrecks should be sampled (to gain data related to environmental history), and how researchers can responsibly remove samples that provide the greatest amount of information while minimizing the damage to these submerged heritage monuments.

An interview with **Dr. Kin-Yan Szeto (Theatre and Dance)** was published in October in The New York Post on Jackie Chan's martial arts fighting style during his film career. Szeto is an Executive Board Member of the Dance Studies Association (DSA) and serves as chair of the Nominations Committee, co-chair of the Awards Committee and a member of the Conference Program Committee. She presented her research at the DSA annual conference in 2017 in Columbus, Ohio. Currently, Szeto is working on

The Art Department's Smith Gallery had incredible success with student and community engagement through its Fall 2017 exhibition "Joel Tauber: The Sharing Project" on display during September and October. The exhibition facilitated a broad range of involvement from students and faculty across the college, showcased the gallery's commitment to education, connected students to real-world social problems and brought new

community audiences into the gallery and on campus.

More than 500 students and faculty participated in the exhibition and its programming. Eighteen classes came to the gallery for tours and guided discussions. To expand its audience and further support faculty teaching, the gallery partnered with Dr. Brooke Hofsess and art education students enrolled in Art 3021: Visual Arts in Elementary Education. Students helped to create a library and activity station at the gallery, produced a series of playshops for preschool-age children and developed lesson plans for sharing themed art projects at Mountain Pathways Montessori School. These activities were supported by public programming that was open to the university and the local community. In addition to an opening reception and artist talk, the gallery offered a talk and workshop series with Les Leopold of the Labor Institute, a veteran activist involved in issues of economic and social justice.

In October, the gallery partnered with the Watauga Public Library to share the project with library patrons in the community. A display to preview the project with programming information was created that included a set of curated books on the theme of sharing for patrons to check out. Additional community connections were built with local groups including the Children's Playhouse, Lucy Brock Preschool, and The Hunger and Health Coalition.



The Mending Initiative, led by Mary Ray and Nancy Oliver in Applied Design, is an interdisciplinary project designed to slow the amount of textile waste sent to landfills. As part of the initiative, apparel design and merchandising students taking a special topics

course taught other students about the importance of extending the life of their clothes by hosting three mending sessions throughout the fall semester. This spring, the Mending Initiative is a project of the Sustainability in Apparel Class and will host several mending sessions for campus and the community.

More than one hundred students from 15 classes in the College of Fine and Applied Arts contributed work to the **Climate** 



**Stories Showcase**, an event featuring visual and performance pieces expressing climate stories stories of those who are already affected by and/ or taking action to address climate change. A few hundred students, faculty, staff and community members attended the December event at HOW Space to experience these climate stories, which were crafted in a variety of creative mediapainting, sculpture, theatrical performance, videography, photography, design, narrative nonfiction and more. This event was part of the **Climate** Stories Collaborative, facilitated by Dr. Derek Davidson (Theatre and Dance) and Laura England (Sustainable Development), an effort to grow the capacity of faculty and students to use a variety of creative media to tell the stories of those who are already affected by, and/or taking action to address, climate change.
